My dear Professor Rio-Hortega:-

Dr. Lawrence S. Kubie, Instructor in Physiology in the School of Medicine of the Johns Hopkins University, is planning to come to Madrid about May 15th, in the hope that he will be able to work with you on some phases of the neurological technique. I am now writing to Professor Ramon y Cajal, with whom Dr. Kubie also hopes to be able to work.

Dr. Kubie graduated from the School of Medicine of this institution several years ago and, for the first few years after his graduation, served on the staff of Phipps Psychiatric Institute under Professor Adolf Meyer. For the past two years he has served as Instructor in Physiology, working upon neurological problems. Dr. Kubie has published several important papers on the histology of the central nervous system and of its meninges. He is a very competent and intelligent young man, of attractive personality and great industry.

Dr. Kubie is planning to go to the Rockefeller Institute next fall to work upon certain experimental neurological problems with Dr. Simon Flexner. For this new work, Dr. Kubie requires a first hand acquaintance with your newer methods of neurological technique and he is therefore anxious to have the opportunity of working with you. May I therefore request that you afford Dr. Kubie this opportunity to work with you in your laboratory? The Faculty of the Johns Hopkins University will appreciate greatly any courtesy which you may extend to Dr. Kubie.
